The college deploys a management information system specifically designed for facilitating communication of relevant information between the students ,parents ,teachers, alumni. The college has its own website in which all information regarding time table ,admission, holidays, seminars, notices, different observances etc are also uploaded. The MIS of the college was operational with proper flow of information to the students through e-mails, phone calls and college website. The Biometric attendance system is employed in the college for all members of staff, both teaching & non-teaching. They register their attendance at the time of arrival and departure which reflects the Seven –hour staying in the college. Our college has various modules of MIS for Administration (HRMS,PIMS),Finance & Accounts (HRMS,IFMS) and for Students admission and Support.

Human Resources Management System(HRMS): HRMS is the flagship project of Centre for Modernizing Government Initiative-CMGI, a society under the General Administration Department, Government of Odisha. HRMS is a database- and- application software to carry out personnel transaction of government employees online through internet. It is the repository of all the service records of the employees of our college through HRMS, an employee may apply for leave, loan, or send their reports, requests or grievances. They can receive the sanction or reply online from their office. HRMS software automatically prepares all accounts and registers of an employee Like Service books, Leave account, Loan account Salary Account, Incumbency chart etc. retrieving relevant data from transactions. It also helps the superannuating employees to prepare their pension papers on the click of the buttons and help authorities to process pension papers easily and quickly.

PIMS: Personal information management system module is linked with DHE website. It was set up to create a database of HR management of Govt & non- Govt colleges to track fast & real time information regarding HR activities.

With PIMS module, our college has developed a centralised employee data hub eliminating redundant and disparate records processes. Accessible from virtually anywhere, one can easily add and update employee information in the office.

IFMS: The Finance department, Government of Odisha runs Integrated Financial Management system. Our college uses this portal for smooth conduct of all financial issues. Salary and arrear bills are prepared through this portal.

SAMS: Student Academic Management System is an Integrated academic management system and comprehensive tool for students/parents, administrators of our college to overcome the challenges in the process of college admission and post admission processes. The entire college admission process is digitized in SAMS, starting from Application, Selection, Intimation, admission, issuing of ID cards of students, issuing of C.L.C, maintenance of database of students is also done in this portal.

The whole campus is under the surveillance of CCTV.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS
1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation
1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words
The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process. The college is affiliated to Rama Devi Women’s University, Bhubaneswar, Odisha. in 2015-16 and adheres to the guidelines laid down by it. The uniform choice based credit system (CBCS) of curriculum was introduced in 25.07.2019. For effective implementation of the curricular programme, a meeting is held with all HODs and members of different cells and committee under the chairmanship of the principal. All H.O.D.s are informed to carry out their academic responsibilities and also to maintain their academic records. The committee and cells are directed to carry out their responsibilities sincerely.

IQAC prepares the calendar of events for the entire academic year with its Planned meetings which are scheduled quarterly. Accordingly a plan of action takes place under the supervision of the Head of the Institution.

The Time –table is prepared and faculty members prepare the lesson plan keeping in mind the paper wise units and semester time limits before the commencement of classes, and submit it to the Head of the Institution. To ensure successful curriculum coverage faculty members maintain and record the daily progress in the the Lesson Plan & Progress Register. The lesson plans and progress registers of all the departments are verified by the respective H.O.Ds before they are submitted to the Head of the Institution for verification every month.

For effective academic delivery, the faculty members modify the class room environment in response to the needs of students by making use of computers & LCD projectors. The quality of learning is enhanced by ensuing students to participate in departmental seminars, preparing dissertations, projects, assignments ,study tours, monthly tests, oral discussions after each class. There are provisions for remedial classes and doubt clearing classes for the slow achievers and extra classes to compensate the delay if any in completion of the course. The Mentor-mentee system and proctorial classes have been developed to facilitate hassle free academic programme and effective teaching and learning activity. The students are acquainted with the pattern of the examination & are given useful tips for better result. The faculty members maintain Teacher’s Dairy, Departmental Progress Register in which all the classes and extra curricular activities done by them are reflected. The annual report of departments in which all the activities which includes Seminars, Achievements of both students and faculties, monthly tests, mentorship classes, proctorial classes etc. is submitted to IQAC at the end of the session. Each department conducts CIE (CONTINUOUS INTERNAL EVALUATION) during each semester of the academic session. Certificate courses and value added courses are introduced with a view to creating opportunities for self employment and entrepreneurship.

Thus teaching –learning process is planned beforehand to make it effective & student centric. Formulation of teaching workload, identification of total no. of teaching days, identifying ability level of students, developing performance & other teacher pedagogies are planned, implemented and enriched keeping in mind the objectives of achieving academic excellence through the course plan.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)				

The Institution had developed feedback format for parents, students, teachers, Alumni & employers. The feedback system has been evolved to collect opinions, suggestions and ideas for the development of the institution. The IQAC designs the formats through a structured questionnaire, provides all the feedback formats to all the departments in the month of October and collects in November. The stakeholders are advised to record their responses freely and honestly without fear and prejudices. The feedback forms covers queries on the quality of teaching-learning, evaluation, ICT tools, infrastructure, support services, governance, leadership, co-curricular activities, sports, and the academic ambience. On the basis of feedback received from the five stakeholders, necessary steps had been undertaken for the development of those areas. Students had higher degree of satisfaction on quality of classroom teaching, examination & evaluation, interaction with teachers inside and outside the class, guidance, counselling, departmental seminar library and the students have mediocre degree of satisfaction on co-curricular activities, Library, cleanliness and ambience, canteen facilities, security arrangement. Students have low degree of satisfaction on internet facilities in the institution. Likewise parents have low degree of satisfaction on internet, canteen facilities, toilets. But they have appreciated the teaching learning process and satisfied with the academic ambience. On the basis of all the feedback, the institution has been taken the initiative to provide internet connection to all the departments and conference hall. Action has been taken to upgrade library with course books and reference books.

The institution believes in better student teacher interaction in building the academic atmosphere in the campus. For this, it undertakes a host of students centric methods for enhancing the learning experiences of the students. So mentoring system was introduced in our institute in 2018 to encourage the students to developed and maintain a special bond with the teachers.

Before the commencement of classes in the academic year 2018-19, all mentorship classes were distributed among all the faculties.

The mentor-mentee ratio is 1:27. Mentorship classes are taken once in a week which is reflected In the time table.

In the mentorship class each mentor takes care of the mentees placed under him or her and tries to resolved their following issues :

1. Health
2. Finance
3. Academic
4. Communication
5. Personal
6. Social
7. Psychological
8. emotional
9. Familial

It is observed that maximum students have financial, psychological communication & academic problems. Accordingly the mentor detects the slow learners & advanced learners & solve the problems. The slow learners are encouraged to concentrate on the weak area of study and to attend remedial classes. The advanced learners are encouraged to focus on studies apart their syllabus . Some psychological issues are solved by the faculties of the department of Psychology. Some of our faculties take the steps to help some of students financially.

The mentor also enlightens the students with some topics related to moral values.

Conclusion:-

By this mentorship class, the institution finds out the inference that the students have become morally strong and active and have shown an increased interest to participate in different extra-curricular activities, sports and extension activities organized in and outside the college.

Mentors' counselling and guidance in mentorship classes have helped a lot in boosting the self confidence of the mentees.

Objectives – Our college being a women’s college organised a health camp to make the rural adolescent aware of their health and hygiene.

Content –Women related health programme

1. To create health and hygiene awareness among the rural adolescents.
2. To obviate all shorts of taboos and apprehensions .
3. To prepare an adolescent for future motherhood .
4. To instill the sense of sanitization in the adolescents during puberty .

About the practice – Our motto is upkeeping of the dignity and empowerment of women. Our mission is specifically caters to the education and health need of the rural girls. An Awareness programme is organised by IQAC in collaboration with Home science department . As it is a women’s college our goal is to ensure good health and hygiene amongst the women in the college and around . The students and faculties of Home Science Department visited a nearby village, Duragaprasad of Nayagarh District and made the whole rural woman folk aware of the physical changes of the women anatomy with growing age , the bodily changes in puberty , the menstrual cycle and its related health problems . There was a threadbare discussion with the rural women with regard to their menstrual cycle and cleanliness and use of sanitary napkin etc. .
